YR 7 & 8 COORDIATOR Ev Sasin

This Semester, students have engaged in a range of learning experiences that fostered collaboration, innovation and resilience building capabilities.

In Year 7 Science, students explored separation of mixtures and substances and conducted several scientific experiments to consolidate their learning. In English, students focussed on how informative and procedural texts can use graphics for an identified purpose. In Geography, students investigated Water in the World and how water is a renewable environmental resource. In Innovation, students produce designed solutions through selecting and combining characteristics and properties of materials, systems, components, tools and equipment to build a Marble Run. In Music, students continued to be immersed in genres of music around the world and continued creating their own compositions using Garageband.

In Year 8 Science, students examined the history of our Earth and specific landforms, which are made of many different varieties of rocks. Students reflected on how these incredible materials can empower our civilisation. Students also grew their own crystals. In Maths, students investigated terminating and non-terminating decimals, percentages increases and discounts, as well as the congruence of triangles. In English, students explored the social impact of big business, with a particular focus on Australian companies contributing to poverty overseas by not paying a living wage. In Geography, students explored Pangea and touched on Earth's layers and the process by which the tectonic plates and continents began to spread. In Business, students became entrepreneurs and developed their own businesses. Students will design and produce their products or services to sell at the annual Arcadia College Market Day.





YR 9 COORDINATOR

This semester, the Year 9 students in Science have recently learned about volcanoes, tsunamis, and earthquakes. They studied how these natural disasters happen and their effects. To apply what they learned, the students used LEGO to design and build tsunami-proof houses. This handson project helped them understand the challenges of building safe structures in disaster-prone areas and allowed them to get creative with problem-solving.

Also the year 9 students recently took part in an exciting cooking class for innovation, organised in partnership with Bond University and OzHarvest. In this class, they learned how to create new and unique dishes by combining traditional recipes with modern techniques. With guidance from the undergraduate students from Bond University and Arcadia College staff, students explored different flavours and ingredients like chinese five spice for fried rice, mixed herb spice for pita pizzas and mexican spices for burrito bowls. Students also developed their own creative recipes and found out very quickly that some spices do not mix well with others and that using salt and pepper to season dishes is highly recommended. Overall, the student's thoroughly enjoyed the experience as they learnt how to cut onions without having watery eyes, how to work in a team setting and the importance of maintaining a clean kitchen and hygiene. The class aimed to inspire creativity and innovation in the kitchen, helping students to think outside the box, enhance their culinary skills and come to the realization that healthy eating does not have to be expensive.















YR 10 COORDINATOR

The Year 10 students have been very busy in Term 2. There have been two camps, numerous cultural and sporting activities many new learning experiences that have pushed the students to move out of their comfort zone.

In English, the students explored the concepts of persuasive text features and visual literacy techniques through the topic of festivals around the world. We explored Carnival in Venice and Brazil, lantern festivals in Japan, Chinese New Year and even Coachella. They then created their own festivals, planned the events, and designed a video to use as part of a social media campaign. This challenged the students as a main component was oral communication, and none of us like listening to our own voice recordings! However, it was wonderful to see so many step up and design amazingly creative promotional material, with catchy slogans, interesting visuals and witty language features.

This semester, the Year 10 students engaged with the topics of Algebra, Statistics, and Chance and Probability. In Algebra, they explored complex concepts such as quadratic equations and simultaneous equations, developing their problem-solving skills through consistent practice and assessments. In the Statistics unit, students conducted a meaningful investigation into health disparities between Indigenous and non-Indigenous populations, utilizing various statistical tools to analyse and interpret data effectively. This project not only enhanced their understanding of data representation and analysis but also fostered awareness and empathy towards social issues. In Chance and Probability, students confidently applied theoretical and experimental probability principles to real-life scenarios, enhancing their analytical thinking.

Over this term in Science, students examined the diversity of living things and explored genetics and heredity. They examined the relationship between DNA, genes, alleles, and the heritable traits of an organism. Students predicted simple ratios of offspring genotypes and phenotypes in crosses involving dominant/recessive gene pairs or in genes that are sex-linked. They examined how meiosis and mutation contribute to genetic variety between organisms. Students investigated changes caused by evolution and natural selection in a particular population as a result of a specified selection pressure such as artificial selection in breeding for desired characteristics.

This term in HPE, students explored resilience and its importance for wellbeing. They examined traits of resilient individuals, developed coping skills, and reflected on emotional responses to various scenarios. The curriculum also covered community perceptions of mental health and strategies to promote mental wellness. A key focus was on online safety, providing students with the knowledge to navigate the digital world securely. This comprehensive approach fostered a holistic understanding of health, resilience, and safety.

In Week 3, Year 10 had the opportunity to attend an overnight camp and Queensland Camping and Conference Centre on Mt. Tamborine. They participated in archery, bush survival and damper making, as well as team formation activities, including sports, musical chairs and karaoke! The Year 10s were praised by QCCC staff for their manners and willingness to engage and help out. It was a fun and rewarding trip for all who attended.



YR 11 COORDINATOR

The Year 11 cohort have had a fantastic first semester of senior schooling, with the students working hard to obtain their QCE. The students have been enjoying the increased autonomy of Year 11 as they work to achieve Flexible Friday afternoons and Flexi Week 10.

Within the classroom, English had students engaging in Language That Works as they explored how meaning is communicated in contemporary texts developed for and used in a work context. Students developed and used a range of strategies and skills to comprehend and interpret these texts, and explored how the relationships between context, purpose, and audience create meaning in work-related texts. In Maths, students developed mathematical understanding and skills to solve problems relating to the topics of Number, Representing Data, and Graphs. For both English and Maths assessments, students completed a formalised Exam. This was an extremely important learning experience as students learnt and adjusted to Exam conditions as a practice for their Year 12 Common Internal Assessments. Students absolutely smashed these Exams, and it was noted by staff how confident and successful the students were under these stressful conditions.

In Social and Community Studies, students explored contemporary issues that have a local and personal connection, including fast fashion, technology obsolescence, local habitat degradation, waste recycling, renewable energy opportunities and challenges, and barriers to sustainability that result from different community and personal behaviours. Students considered ways to bring about meaningful change through their choices, for example with forms of personal and social action and behavioural change that have environmental, social, cultural, and/or financial impacts.

Outside of the classroom, students have been engaging in many extracurricular activities, including the Empower Her Sound DJ program, the Gold Coast Careers Festival, Interschool Cup competitions, and many students are completing their own TAFE and Trade Certificates. Mid Term 2 saw 20 students who have been demonstrating positive engagement and effort in English be selected to attend a Reward Excursion to the Cinema and be treated to a nice lunch afterward. The students were really pleased to be selected, recognised, and rewarded for their efforts. All students should be really proud of their efforts and achievements so far and look forward to an even more successful Semester 2.







YR 12 COORDINATOR

During Term 2, Year 12 students have engaged across a variety of curricula and extra-curricular activities.

In the classroom, they have gained valuable experience in measurement, as well as interpreting and comparing data; had the chance to explore local and global issues and how they are represented in a range of texts; have been immersed in the concept of gender, focusing on how gender roles have evolved throughout history; have been given the opportunity to discuss, analyse and evaluate both the harmful and beneficial associations with gender roles, emphasising the cultural and religious factors that have shaped these constructions; were able to explore and investigate the theory and practices behind diets and healthy lifestyles, as well as investigate the chemistry of foods through hands-on activities and gained knowledge of nutrients in different plants; were able to participate in the Gold Coast Airport Decal Design Project, where they created digital decal designs with an environmental message for their three new compactor trucks; connected with self and country through the creation of arts products that brought awareness to the Australian Government's 'Close The Gap' strategy; as well as develop and improve on their organisational and administrative skills through the planning and implementation of a Touch Football Tournament.

Outside of the classroom, there has been a wealth of opportunities for our students including the commencement of Unistart. This coupled with their certificate courses and usual curriculum load, has given them a taste of the real world and study to come. Students undertook a Life Changer Program which saw them explore the themes of:

Effective leadership, stress management, mindfulness, personal values and beliefs and resilience. The Year 12 cohort went to the Gold Coast Careers Festival giving them access to speak with a diverse collective of educators, career specialists, industry experts offering them insights into options for next year. Students who are gaining their extra QCE points via a Certificate II in Cookery, have been busily getting their hands dirty in the CBUS stadium kitchens and cooking up a storm. Aurora Training Institute brought their coffee machines in to qualify students with espresso skills and had the students pouring coffees for staff. The students have been given many more opportunities including charity endeavours through Rosies - Friends on the Street, workshops and excursions for the Ecomariners, DJ-ing experience and excursions to the Botanical Gardens, Southern Cross University and Temple Gym.


Students are beginning to complete their sections and have sent them to their assessors for approval. This is a huge achievement, and finishing sections this early in the year is something the students should be really proud of.
